Epiphany - January 6th

December 25 (Christmas Day) begins the 'season' of Christmas which lasts 12 days until the festival of Epiphany on January 6. Epiphany, along with Easter and Pentecost is one of the three oldest and most important festivals observed by the early Christian church. The word Epiphany comes from the Greek word *epiphania* which can be translated as **appearing**. Epiphany has a variety of meanings closely related to one another; the shining of a light, a manifestation, an appearance, or a revelation. Epiphany "illuminates" or reveals to us the divinity of our Lord who was made known to the whole world for the first time by the visit of the magi from the east. There is no mention of how many wise men visited but tradition says three, probably because there were three gifts mentioned (gold, frankincense and myrhh). The Hebrews expected for centuries a star as sign of the birth of the Messiah. It was the shining of the light (the star) that brought the magi to Jesus who is the "a light for revelation to the Gentiles" Luke 2:32. Epiphany is a festival day of light and is denoted by the liturgical color white. It ushers in the season of Epiphany which lasts until the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Jesus said of himself, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." (John 8:12)

Congregational Meeting

A Congregational Meeting was held on Sunday, December 31st, at 9:45 a.m. The purpose of the meeting was to determine what the congregation wants to do next regarding our call process. A vote was taken and it was decided to have our name put on the list to hopefully receive a newly graduated seminary student. Placement of pastors (call day) is usually the end of April. 
Quarterly Voters' Meeting

Swaddling Clothes

Swaddling Clothes Update

Our next "Swaddling Clothes" shopping day is scheduled for the second Saturday of the month which is Saturday, January 13th, with shopping from 9 a.m. to noon. For those who can't attend on Saturday, we will be open on Monday afternoon, January 15th, from 4:30 until 6:00 p.m.

We have been so blessed by the many donations we have received! We are taking donations of good, gently used winter children's clothing from newborn to size 10, along with maternity clothing, and items used for raising children, like highchairs, cribs, baby swings, etc. We aren't taking any toys at this time! If you'd like to donate but don't have the clothing, baby items, etc., here are some other needs we have. We need zipper bags sandwich through jumbo size, batteries (AA, AAA, C, and D), baby wipes, diapers, Pull-Ups for both boys and girls, baby wash, and diaper cream. We are very appreciative of the many volunteers who take the clothing baskets that we set out in the narthex that need to be laundered.

We had preschool visitors at our Swaddling Clothes in December. There were 2 classes of preschoolers for a total of 44 children each bringing donations rather than sharing gifts with classmates. We are so appreciative of their giving!

Here are a few other ways to help out our Swaddling Clothes program:

*Drop off unwanted household items, furniture and adult clothing at Stuff, Etc. Consignment Store in Cedar Rapids. Swaddling Clothes also has a "charitable store account" there. What this means is that you can bring in your gently used, unwanted items to the Stuff, Etc-Cedar Rapids location and donate your items under Swaddling Clothes-St. John Lutheran Church, Keystone account #36081. This is an opportunity for you to purge unwanted household items, furniture and adult clothing, and help Swaddling Clothes raise money for ongoing expenses. After your items are sold, a portion of each sale is deposited into the Swaddling Clothes consignment account. We can use the money as store credit at Stuff, Etc to purchase needed items or withdraw the money to purchase needed items elsewhere. Keep in mind that we still need your maternity clothes, newborn thru size 10 children's clothes and any baby-care related items to be brought here to the church for our "shopping days".

*Pass along unwanted gift cards and coupons to Swaddling Clothes. We may be able to use them to benefit Swaddling Clothes.

*When out shopping the after-Christmas sales, ask yourself if Swaddling Clothes could benefit from some of the clearance items.

*Use your reward points or rebate cash to purchase baby-care items. A couple of great examples of this is something like Kohl's Cash. Rather than letting it expire without using it, perhaps pick up something that Swaddling Clothes could use or Menard's 11% rebate that provides in store credit to make purchases. That could be used to purchase toothbrushes or stocking hats, etc.

*Most of all, please pray for the Swaddling Clothes program that we may continue to provide items that some can't afford to purchase on their own.

During the winter months at St. John there is a group of ladies who volunteer on Tuesdays to create and sew beautiful quilts. This year a total of 104 quilts were donated!

- + 43 quilts were donated to Lutheran World Relief along with 5 baby care kits.
- + 13 quilts were donated to the Willis Dady Shelter in Cedar Rapids. *Willis Dady Homeless Services* provides shelter, case management, homeless preventions, and veteran support for Cedar Rapids, Iowa and the surrounding area.
- + 6 quilts were donated to Treasures Resale Store in Cedar Rapids. *Treasures Quality Resale Shoppe, Shop for Life!* is a resale store benefitting Bridgehaven Pregnancy Support Center in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. They have clothing for the whole family, kitchen, home décor, toys, collectibles, and more! Treasures is located at 405 8th Avenue next to Bills Brothers Furniture and just down from Mercy Hospital (Emergency Room side). This is a great store with quality items, check it out!
- + 3 quilts were donated to Central Lutheran School's Spring fundraising auction.
- + 9 quilts were donated to Swaddling Clothes here at St. John.
- + 17 quilts were donated to Orphan Grain Train warehouse in Clemons, Iowa. OGT mission: Sharing resources and bringing Christ's name and character to needy people both far and near. Orphan Grain Train is a Christian volunteer network that ships donated food, clothing, medical supplies, and other needed items to people in 71 different countries including the USA.
- + 5 quilts were donated to Central Furniture Rescue in Cedar Rapids. *Central Furniture Rescue* provides furniture and household items at no cost to individuals and families who are transitioning out of homelessness and into their own places to live.
- + 8 quilts were donated to Camp Io-Dis-E-Ca for their fundraising auction and were sold for a total of \$700.

They also have some quilts saved back for local benefits and fundraisers. Please contact the church office if you know of a worthy cause who we could benefit from a quilt donation.

The quilting ladies will start meeting in the lower level at the church again on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>January 9th</u>, and will meet each Tuesday as long as weather permits. They are always looking for people to help. If you'd be interested, bring a scissors, needle with a large eye for tying, and a sack lunch if you plan to stay over the noon hour. Come for as long as your schedule permits, they usually quit around 2:00 p.m. Also, in order to make diapers and a few other items for Orphan Grain Train and World Relief they are in need of a Serger machine.
