

- 2) Sunday School teaches children how to navigate the Bible. Sunday School teachers don't just teach Bible stories, they show how to use a concordance and give a basic understanding of the Bible's books and format.
- 3) Sunday School gives kids a chance to ask questions. Sunday School is the perfect format for discussions and allows teachers to give kids more good food for thought.
- 4) Sunday School develops a community of believers. In a classroom setting, kids are more likely to help one another and push each other along in growth. A community of children, worshipping, learning the Bible, and discovering Jesus together creates a bond that single study can't accomplish. Sunday Schools are the Petri dishes for the future church.
- 5) Sunday School plants spiritual seeds. In the classroom are songs, Bible lessons, and love. Sunday School has been described as plant nurseries, they make look unimpressive at first, but under the soil, miracles are happening.



"To the holy and faithful in Christ" (Colossians 1:2),

In the midst of persecution and trial what can I do?

Today, just like in the book of Acts, Christians are persecuted all over the world for following Jesus. While Christian persecution takes many forms, it is loosely defined as any outward hostility experienced as a result of identification with Christ. Trends show that countries in Africa, Asia and the Middle East are intensifying persecution against Christians.

It may be easy to think that persecution of Christians only happens in faraway countries, right? Wrong! Christian persecution is happening right here at home, in America. Many here are attacked for their faith. Here are just a few examples; A Washington football coach is placed on leave for praying with players; A teacher is fired for giving a student a Bible (This occurred **AFTER** class and this was **AFTER** the student first asked questions and let the teacher know they did not have a Bible); The IRS was shown to deny and harass Christian groups seeking tax-exempt status; A Christian teacher was fired after only expressing concern about a LGBTQ themed book being read to young children; An elderly woman was shot while campaigning against pro-abortion proposals; After the US Supreme Court overruled Roe v. Wade (6/24/2022), over **100** pro-life pregnancy centers and churches have been vandalized including property damage, theft, arson, vulgar graffiti and death threats. The FBI has promised to investigate and to date, not ONE arrest; Multiple Christian clubs and school related groups have been kicked out or off school campuses and many speakers have been forbidden to go on school grounds for "fear" of violence; Do I need mention the Christian baker Jack Phillips, who has been harassed, persecuted, fined, business threatened with closure and taken to court by the state of Colorado? He went all the way to the US Supreme court and won, then the state filed different charges! I could fill pages with just recent incidents and attacks.

Let's be clear, none of these incidents in the U.S. are comparable to beheadings or burned down churches as seen in many other places in the world, but it still is a problem that is growing here. Traditional Christians are facing increasing intolerance in this country through fines, lawsuits, jobs lost, officially sanctioned government disdain and harassment, and even ridicule by the main stream media and cultural outlets. In spite of this and at least for now, there is a marked difference between the treatment of Christians in many other countries and what Christians are facing in the U.S. American Christians still enjoy broad religious protections under the law. While a Christian college student in New York City or Los Angeles or any number of other cities might face ridicule for their beliefs, it would be impossible for them to live openly as a Christian if they were living in Afghanistan, or Saudi Arabia or North Korea or China or many other countries.

Unfortunately, persecution against Christians is not something that is always avoidable. Persecution is something that all Christians in one form or another will have to deal with at some point. Understand, Jesus warned us, "If the world hates you, know that it has hated me before it hated you" (John 15:18). To live as a Christian, Jesus tells us, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 16:24-25).

One of the keys to coping and dealing with persecution is OUR reaction to persecution. To not only get through tough times, but to actually thrive through persecution we need to keep "looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God" (Hebrews 12:2). We should daily pray for our country, our leaders and our people. Pray that God would end persecution and harassment, pray that God would protect all His children, and pray that all are brought to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ. And you can pray, come Lord Jesus!

When Jesus' enemies nailed him to a cross, he said, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34). As a Christian, stand up for what you know is true without fear, share Jesus with others always, "turn the other cheek" with those who harass and intimidate you and if persecuted, forgive them, for they know not what they do.

What an interesting study as we compared and contrasted several different religions/cults to the authentic Christ and authentic Christianity. We are therefore seeking your suggestions or nominations. Pray about these positions. Perhaps encourage the people whose names you wrote and explain why you nominated them. The Nominating Committee will contact all nominees to get their approval to have their names submitted for the election in October.
