# "To the holy and faithful in Christ" (Colossians 1:2),

Irony is defined as:

- 1. A figure of speech in which the words or phrases express a meaning that is the direct opposite of the intended meaning.
- 2. An outcome of events contrary to what was, or might have been expected.

Examples of ironic words/phrases abound in our language, such as when someone says; clear as mud or friendly as a rattlesnake or that was about as much fun as a root canal. And ironic events abound in our lives also. Here are a couple of examples; Bette Nesmith Graham, the woman who invented white-out was fired from her job as secretary simply because she did not white-out a mistake! Or, when Beatles guitarist George Harrison died, a tree was planted in a California park in his honor. The tree later died due to a beetle infestation!

The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ is history's greatest irony. It was the eternal God who died on the cross. Man meant the death of Jesus for evil but God used it for good. The Holy and wise Father accomplished His plan through the wickedness and foolishness of men. The Creator let His creation kill him. And Jesus emptied Himself to the point of death on the cross and become last in order that you might have life to fullest and become first! Talk about irony!!

The Gospel accounts of Jesus' last days and hours are full of irony at every turn. Jesus was betrayed with a kiss. Jesus was accused of blasphemy while the accusers committed blasphemy against God. The words of the High Priest that is was expedient (good) that one man should die for the people was true, just not in the way he meant it. The will of God the Father is the same as the mob who yelled to crucify Jesus. And no last words have ever been so ironically true as the mocking sign that Roman governor Pilate ordered nailed on the cross of Jesus which read, Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews.

But that is not all. Think about when Jesus died and was buried, many who had already died and were buried came out of their tombs alive! The world was completely dark for three hours while Jesus was still alive on the cross, but when Jesus died the light returned. But the greatest irony of the death of Jesus was what happened three days later. Jesus gives back the borrowed tomb, as good as new, like it was never used. Death could not hold Jesus. Jesus lives. Jesus is the resurrected and triumphant King of kings and Lord of lords!

It is good for you and your children that one man, Jesus, died. Why? Because of Jesus' death and resurrection "whoever believes in him (Jesus) should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him" (John 3:16-17). Here is the great irony for you and me. Our sins do condemn us and earn us death and hell, but because of Jesus' death and resurrection you get what you don't deserve, forgiveness and eternal life! Today is Easter. There is no irony because Jesus' Easter resurrection is exactly as intended by God the Father. Jesus' Easter resurrection is exactly as God the Father expected. You seek Jesus of Nazareth who was crucified. But He is risen. He is no longer in grave. The ironic sacrifice is now complete. Because Jesus lives, so to, will you and all who believe in Him!

Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Hallelujah!

# **LWML Benton Circuit Spring Rally**

The LWML Benton Zone Spring Rally will be held at St. Stephens in Atkins on Saturday, April 27. Registration is from 8:45 to 9:00 and the rally will conclude with a light lunch at noon. The in-gathering will be monetary donations for Central Lutheran School Playground Project. Theme for the rally is "Growing in Grace and Knowledge Through the Years". The speaker will be Rev. R. Rahn, founder and ambassador for Lutheran Heritage Foundation. Lutheran Heritage Foundation translates and publishes Lutheran resources around the world. All women of the congregation are invited to attend. You do not have to be a LWML member to attend.

# Quilts on Display

This year's beautiful quilts that have been sewn by the St. John Sewing Group will be on display in the church on April 14th. Most of these quilts are sent to Lutheran World Relief with some being sent to service groups around lowa, and some held for donations to fundraisers. Also on display will be the baby care kits that will be shipped to LWR, and the school kits that will be given to Orphan Grain Train. If you desire, you will be able to purchase a displayed quilt for a free-will donation, with proceeds being used to offset shipping costs. These shipping costs have significantly risen since 2020. It costs \$2.80 to ship each quilt, \$3.10 to ship each baby care kit, and \$1.80 for each fabric kit. Last year, 551,700 quilts and kits were shipped to 14 countries! On Tuesday, April 16th, the quilts will be packed up and taken to the Keystone Care Center for the residents there to admire. The LWR quilts and the kits will be taken to an ingathering truck on April 20th in Cedar Rapids to be delivered to a LWR shipping warehouse in preparation for overseas shipping. If you'd like to make a donation to help offset these shipping costs, there is a basket in the narthex or mark an envelope and drop in the offering plate.

#### **Donation Boxes**

There are two collection boxes in the narthex. The larger box is for Orphan Grain Train where we are collecting men's and women's clothing that is clean and in good condition. In the smaller box, we are collecting items to make baby care kits for Lutheran World Relief. Needed are dark colored hand towels, long or short sleeved gowns or sleepers without feet, bath-size bars of a gentle soap (4 to 5 oz. size), jackets, sweaters or sweatshirts with a hood. Knitted/crocheted blankets measuring between 36 to 52 inches are also accepted. Items for this project need to be in the collection box by April 14th.

We are in the process of switching from winter to summer clothing which will be available during our shopping days of April 13th from 9 a.m. until noon, and on Monday, April 15th from 4:30 to 6:00 p.m. We are very appreciative of the many donations we have received but we always need more. We are in need of spring/summer clothing at this time and will accept new/gently used clothing size preemie through youth size 10. No adult clothing except maternity.

We also accept clean, gently-used baby care items, infant toys, and books. No stuffed animals or used toys for children past toddler age are needed or accepted. Contact the church office for a drop-off plan. There are also several baskets of clothing that need laundering setting in the narthex. If you could help with this is would be greatly appreciated. We'd like to have the baskets returned ASAP. Thank you to everyone who helps us through their generous donations and also to those who volunteer to help us with our laundry.

We are often asked "what do you need" or "what should I be looking for when I'm out shopping". Swaddling Clothes now has a wish list gift registry for nonprofits at myregistry.com. The registry lists ideas and suggestions of items that are needed on a regular basis. There often isn't money left in the budget after purchasing diapers and baby wipes for many of the items on this registry. # Summer Camp at Camp Io-Dis-E-Ca "Immanuel - God With Us"

Summer Camp will soon be starting! There are several ways in which to register for camps at Camp Io-Dis-E-Ca. Go to Camp's website, www.campiodiseca.org, to register online or to get a 2024 registration form that can be downloaded and mailed to the camp, or you can pick up a brochure from the card rack outside the church office here at St. John to fill out and mail in. All the information about the many different camps being offered is listed there along with the cost to attend. (Check out the discounts for early registration.) St. John again this year will pay 1/2 of the registration fee up to \$150 for members who attend camp.

Campers spend time every day at Camp Io-Dis-E-Ca studying God's Word. Each year, their Bible study is centered around a theme from Scripture. Though every camper learns the same theme, each program's Bible study is modified to fit the age group of the program. Campers also participate in multiple devotions each day that fit the Biblical theme and teaches them about Christ.
